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Lesson 1

Theme: Never mind the weather

What is the weather?

Weather describes what's it like outside. Is it rainy, sunny, cloudy, partly cloudy, windy, strong winds, thunderstorms, etc

Activity:

2. Captions are short sentences that describe an illustration or photograph. Write a caption of about five words for each photograph.

For the next few days' learners have to look at weather reports and forecasts.

Weather reports describe the weather. They tell us what the weather is probably going to be like in a particular place.

A weather report has a lot of information such as dates, days, place names, temperature, wind speeds and sea tides.

Learners can watch weather reports on television during the newswatch slot, or they can access the 24 hour weather channel on DSTV channel 180 or read it in the newspaper or google weather reports on websites like

1. Let's be creative and make up our own weather chart and predict what the weather is going to be like for the next week. Complete the table below. *Do not repeat any of the weather conditions.


Weather Conditions: briefly describe the weather for the day and include a minimum and maximum temperature. We measure temperature in degrees Celsius written as °C. the weather condition has to correlate with the temperatures. For example if we say it is going to be sunny, our temperatures have to be above 25 °C.

Hurricane Katrina: Updated: Aug. 25, 2010

Hurricane Katrina, which struck the American southern states in the early hours of the morning on 29 August 2005, had a **devastating** effect on the region, including the famous city of New Orleans.

Experts who have studied the disaster described the hurricane as having the force of four storms rolled into one. It packed winds that howled through the region at 235 km per hour, **pummelling** thousands of homes and buildings to pieces.

More than 1700 people were killed as the storm raged and more than a million people were left without shelter and access to power. A 9m wall of sea water - the highest wave ever recorded of the coast of the United States - swept inland, highways in New Orleans were **submerged** hundreds of miles away from the storm's centre and many residents had to be rescued from the roofs of their homes. Streets were turned into **canals** as boats cruised the streets rescuing stranded survivors.

The damage to the region, running to billions of dollars, has made Hurricane Katrina one of the costliest storms in history.

Language practice: Degrees of comparison


In our last lesson we looked at adjectives - describing words.
